Students must have a GPA of 3.25 or higher at graduation. (Navy, Light Blue and Grey Cord.)
- ‡ Presidential Honors Scholars: In addition to earning an Honors diploma by completing all requirements of the Honors program, these students have earned the Presidential Honors Scholarship while at Cleveland State. Students are chosen for this prestigious scholarship based on at least a 3.5 high school GPA and a score of at least 24 on the ACT.

- Silver Award for completing 50-74 Service-Learning Hours (Silver Lapel Pin.)

Historically, a mace was designed as a weapon. By the 13th century, a decorated mace was used for ceremonial purposes in England and France. Over the centuries, the use of a ceremonial mace became a tradition in colleges and universities to lead processionals and signify the significance of the occasion.

Cleveland State's mace was presented as a gift from the 6th President, Dr. William A. Seymour, and his wife Catherine Seymour. In-kind donations were made by Epperson Jewelers, who provided the engraving, Jordan Fabricating, who developed the head piece, and Ed Lewis, retired physics teacher who carved the top section of the staff.

The design and production work for the mace was performed by Cleveland High School students participating in Mr. David Gluckner's Engineering class during the Spring 2016 semester. Gluckner's commitment and diligence to see this project through to completion was greatly appreciated.

A series of silver rings make up the lower section of the staff. The first ring indicates the founding of the college in 1967. The next six rings identify the six presidents of the college with their respective years of service. Several blank rings are available for future presidents.

The top part of the staff is carved to flare out toward the head piece. This is to symbolize the ever-growing impact that Cleveland State has on our community through student education and economic development. The silver head piece has several sides coming to the point representing the diversity of students we serve who come together to improve their careers, families, and community. Inside the head piece is a hand-blown glass flame. Its blue color celebrates the history of Cleveland State and inspires us all towards an even brighter future.



Academic Regalia

Academic dress dates back to the earliest days of the oldest universities. In the 1700's academic costume was used at King's College (now Columbia University), the University of Pennsylvania and other colleges founded in Colonial days. In 1821, all "Doctors, Licentiates and Bachelors" of the University of Columbia were required by law to wear gowns.

Prior to the advent of two-year colleges and the awarding of the associate degree, the three academic degrees generally recognized were the bachelor, the master and the doctor. The name of each degree seems to have been determined by medical university custom. The bachelor's degree, the baccalaureate, takes its name directly from the medical practice of "bachelors" wearing a garland of bayberries. The master's degree was equivalent to a license to teach. The doctor's degree was originally a title of respect in recognition of great learning. Today, the earned doctor's degree indicates advanced study and independent research in a specialized field of learning.

In 1895, an intercollegiate commission drafted a uniform code for the use of academic caps, gowns and hoods in the United States. A commission appointed by the American Council on Education revised the code in minor details in 1935. Again in 1959, the American Council on Education's Committee on Academic Costumes and Ceremonies reviewed the code and made several changes. This code is followed by 95 percent of all colleges and universities.

Gowns recommended for use in the colleges and universities of this country have the following characteristics. The gown for the associate's degree is similar to that of the bachelor's except in color. The gown for the bachelor's degree has pointed sleeves. It is designed to be worn closed. The gown for the master's degree has an oblong sleeve, open at the wrist, like the others. The sleeve base hangs down in the traditional manner. The rear part of its oblong shape is square—cut and the front part has an arc cut away. Like that for the doctor's degree, the master's gown is so designed and supplied with fasteners that it may be worn open or closed. The doctor's gown is velvet faced down the front and has three velvet bars on bell—shaped sleeves.

The shape and size of the hood impart the degree. The hood further identifies the field of study and the university or college from which the degree was obtained. The hoods are lined with the official color or colors of the college or university conferring the degree. The binding or edging of the hood is of velvet or velveteen in widths of two inches, three inches, and five inches for the bachelor's, master's and doctor's degrees respectively. The color of the stripe on the hood indicates the field of study in which the degree was earned or granted, as for example: Arts, WHITE; Social Sciences, CITRON (grayish green yellow); Business, DRAB (light brown); Law, PURPLE; Divinity, SCARLET; Journalism, CRIMSON; Physical Education, SAGE GREEN; Education, LIGHT BLUE; Economics, COPPER; Nursing, APRICOT; Sciences, GOLDEN YELLOW; Musical Arts, PINK; Engineering, ORANGE; Library Science, LEMON; Public Administration, PEACOCK BLUE; Philosophy, DARK BLUE; and Fine Arts, BROWN. A special BURGUNDY stole embroidered with the Cleveland State seal in white signifies our level two advisors who have undergone additional training to support students.

The appropriate cap for all degrees is the familiar black "mortar board." The black tassel, or one of a color signifying the field of specialization, hanging to the left of the face, is appropriate for all degrees. Permissible for the doctor's degree is a soft velvet cap of the color indicating the field of study or on the "mortar board" a tassel of gold thread.

The Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) system consists of 40 institutions with a combined annual enrollment of nearly 120,000 students, ranking it the largest system of public higher education in Tennessee. TBR's 13 community colleges and 27 colleges of applied technology offer classes in almost all of Tennessee's 95 counties.

The Tennessee Board of Regents was created in 1972 by the General Assembly as the governing body of the State University and Community College System of Tennessee. At that time, the member institutions of the system were the six state universities and ten community colleges formerly governed by the Tennessee Board of Education. In 1983, the General Assembly transferred the technical institutes and area vocational schools (now called Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology) to the Tennessee Board of Regents. In 2017, the six universities separated and are now governed by local boards. The University of Tennessee is a separate system with its own Board of Trustees. The Board of Regents, UT Board of Trustees and the locally governed universities are coordinated by the Tennessee Higher Education Commission.

The composition of the Tennessee Board of Regents is set forth in Tennessee Code Annotated 49-8-201. The board consists of 19 members: 12 lay citizens appointed for six-year terms by the governor, with one each from the state's nine congressional districts and three grand divisions; one voting and one non-voting faculty member from among the system institutions appointed by the governor for a one-year term; one student from among the system institutions appointed by the governor for a one-year term; and four ex-officio members--the Governor of Tennessee, the Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Executive Director of the Tennessee Higher Education Commission, who is a non-voting member.


